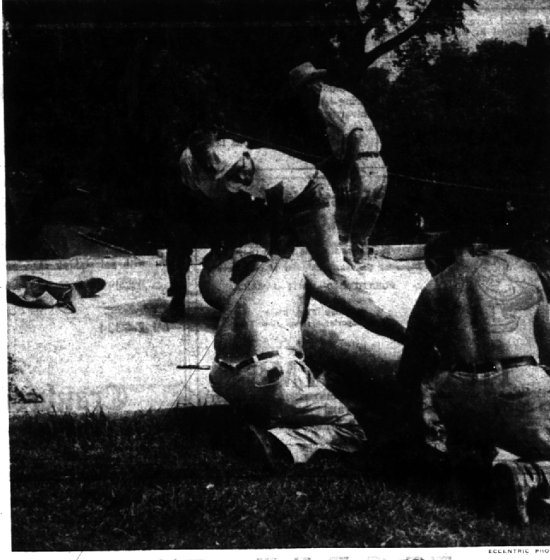


## Work Creates Beauty . . . . .

Nothing like the high seas for enjoying an anniversary present. And that's just where the Rev. Dr. and Mrs. W. Glen Harris are, bound for Europe aboard the Queen Mary, which sailed yesterday.

The six-week trip is a gift from First Presbyterian church's members. It was their way of expressing their appreciation to Dr. Harris who he celebrated his 20th anniversary as minister to the church last spring.

He looked mighty happy when he visited him last Thursday in his big, pleasant study at the church. After they arrive in Southampton, he told me, they will visit the Brussels world's fair, then go on to Germany, France, and Switzerland, spending ten days altogether on the continent.

NEXT THEY will go to Scotland, where Dr. Harris has been invited to preach, one Sunday at Johnshaven, and the next Sunday at Benholm near Montrose.

From there he will spend about ten days visiting the cathedrals in southern England.

He'll have his camera along and will take lots of pictures, concentrating on shots that will help him tell a picture story on the Reformation after he gets back Aug. 21.

Since everyone in Dr. Harris' church enjoyed the color slides and talks about his trip to Israel last year maybe there was an additional motive behind their gift to him!

It's a cinch they'll enjoy the illustrated talks next winter resulting from his anniversary present.

UNUSUAL, but wonderful, is the occasional decision of a successful businessman to enter the ministry.

While I talked to Dr. Harris, he told me about Richard Moss Gray, who attended First Presby-

terian church until recently. The Gray's moved to Birmingham from Haddonfield, N. J., sometime last year, Dr. Harris said. They lived at 189 Pilgrim.

Mr. Gray committed to his work as creative director of the Detroit office of N. W. Ayer. He had been with the nationally known firm for 16 years.

He was active in the local church's youth program as a discussion leader.

LAST MONTH Mr. Gray quit his job and the family moved to California, where he will enter San Francisco theological seminary training for three years' training for the ministry.

While their two young daughters attend school in Carmel, Calif., Mrs. Gray will be teaching home economics.

I asked Dr. Harris why Mr. Gray made his decision, and he said, "He just felt the call to the ministry."

Maybe it was similar to the experience of the Rev. Louis Gillette, of Nativity Episcopal church, who said, "Suddenly I realized that the work I was doing in my church meant more to me than the job I had."

AT THE SAME time First Presbyterian church announced Mr.

Gray was a candidate for the ministry, they revealed that David Elbert, 1066 Wimbleson, plans to enter Princeton theological seminary following his graduation from Alma college.

NOW THAT the Kirk in the Hills church is nearing completion, the Rev. Dr. Harold C. DeWindt is currently preparing a guide book describing the symbolism and religious significance of the church's design. His stone carvings, stained glass windows and other works of art.

When I asked Dr. DeWindt if he was going to be the shipboard preacher on a South American cruise again this summer, he said, "No, ma'am, I'm going to stay here and get this church finished. So my congregation can get moved in."

TO LEARN more about working with senior high youth groups, several Baptist adult workers from this area attended a week's training course last week at the American Baptist League, Green Lake, Wis.

The course's lengthy name is "The National Training Laboratory for Adult Workers with Senior Highs."

### Studies View Religion and Health

For the third year, First Baptist church of Birmingham offers a "Summer School of Bible Study." The current course is based on "Religion and Health." The Bible studies are presented by the pastors of the church, Dr. Emil Kuntz and Dr. Robert Nacoosky. They are held Wednesday evenings at 8, starting July 16.

Topics to be considered include: "More Than A Body," "Toward A Sound Mind," "Soul Sickness—Cause and Cure," "Health and Healing Techniques," "Faith and Faith Partners," "Medicine and Religion"—partners. These popular Bible studies are open to the general public.

"The New Testament gives general consideration to these basic and important human concerns," declared Dr. Kuntz.

"Christ and the early church," he added, "directed much of their effort in the ministry of health and healing. There is a current revival of interest in this field.
