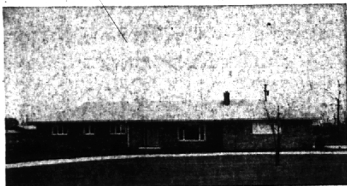

FRANKLIN—Following his election to the Bloomfield Hills board of education, Max Miller of Franklin road last week submitted his resignation as secretary of the Franklin volunteer fire department.

An active member of the fire group for almost a decade, Miller has been a fire commissioner since 1953. Although he will continue to be a member of the department, Miller relinquished his secretarial duties to Ben Harris of Rosemond court, Franklin.

More monitors have been authorized, bringing the department total to eight. Four volunteers are assigned an invitation to participate in the Pontiac fire prevention week scheduled for October, and have assigned the auxiliary unit made up of local youths to take part in the field competition.

Franklin Council Hears Plans for Road Drainage

FRANKLIN—A detailed report on the Franklin road drainage situation was presented to the village council Monday night by Stanley Hunter, Franklin's street administrator.

The council and engineers will meet next Monday to further their study of the report.

The report, prepared by Hubbell, Roth and Clark engineers, offers a complete road drainage program for the area south and west of the Franklin community church, including Wellington road to Fringe.

HUNTER presented two proposals. One proposal develops a complete drainage basin, taking in the whole northwest section of the village. This might require the declaration of a new drainage assessment by the village.

The second proposal is a solution, which would tie the existing highway drains into the Franklin river.

Concern was expressed by Councilman Edward Green that the temporary plan might contribute to the pollution of the river, which might place Franklin in violation of the county drain authority, forcing the village to participate in the Evergreen interceptor program. This would mean additional finances out of the Franklin village's pockets.
