### VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD ORDINANCE NO. 16

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SWIMMING POOLS; PRESCRIBING STANDARD AND REQUIREMENTS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SWIMMING POOLS AND SWIMMING POOL EQUIPMENT AND APPLIANCES; AND PRESCRIBING PENALTY VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Village of Westwood Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Swimming Pool Ordinance of the Village of Westwood.

Section 2.01. Definition. For the purpose of this Ordinance the term swimming pool shall be defined to mean any artificially constructed, non-portable pool, to be used or used for swimming or bathing, having a depth of 2 feet or more and intended to be used in connection with a single family dwelling by the occupant thereof and his guests.

Section 3.01. Permit Required. Before any swimming pool shall be constructed, application for a permit shall be made to the Building Department, which application shall be accompanied by a complete and detailed set of plans and specifications evidencing compliance with the provisions of this Ordinance and the Health Department. Before any building permit shall be issued for the construction of a swimming pool, the plans and specifications shall be approved by the Building Department and the Health Department. Before a swimming pool shall be used, it shall be finally inspected and approved by the Building Department and Health Department. Fees for such permit shall be as determined by the Village Council.

Section 4.01. Enclosure of Swimming Pool and Side Yard Requirements. Every swimming pool shall be completely surrounded by a fence or wall not less than 4 feet in height, which shall be so constructed as not to have openings, holes or gaps larger than 2 inches in any dimension except for doors and gates. A dwelling house or accessory building may be used as part of such enclosure. All gates or doors opening through such enclosure shall be equipped with a self-closing, self-latching device for keeping the door securely closed at all times when not in actual use, except that the door of any dwelling which forms a part of the enclosure need not be so equipped.

The requirements of the foregoing paragraph shall be applicable to all new swimming pools hereafter constructed and shall apply to all existing pools which have a minimum depth of 2 feet of water. The Building Department shall allow a reasonable period within which to comply with the requirements of said paragraph in respect to existing pools.

Out-of-door swimming pools may be constructed or erected provided no part thereof shall approach nearer than 6 feet from the side or rear lot lines measured to the water's edge.

Section 5.01. Construction and Operation Regulations. The following regulations shall apply to the construction and operation of swimming pools:

- (a) The pool construction shall conform to the building code, the plumbing code and the electrical code of the Village of Westwood.
- (b) Fiberglass and plastic pools may be permitted, provided the same meet the accepted safety and construction standards.
- (c) Any accessory building, pump, filter, equipment and filtering equipment must conform to the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance and Building Code of the Village.
- (d) Illuminating lights shall be so erected, installed and shielded so as to eliminate direct rays and minimize reflected rays upon adjoining premises.
- (e) Electric wires near or over the swimming pool shall be at least twenty (20) feet above the water surface.
- (f) All plumbing shall be done by a licensed plumber and shall conform to the requirements of the Plumbing Code of the Village.
- (g) There shall be no direct cross-connection with the Village or home water supply and the swimming pool. The plumbing shall be provided, an air-gap delivery connection at least 6 inches above the flood rim of the pool or make-up tank.
- (h) Scum drain troughs and valves shall be in proportion to the size of the pool and shall be vented at the extreme ends. A back water valve shall be installed in the scum drain before connecting to the sewers.
- (i) The water for the pool shall be filtered, chlorinated and recirculated at least every 12 hours. Hair and lint strainers must be provided to protect the pumps. Chlorination shall be by automatic feed carrying from 0.2 to 0.5 parts per million residual chlorine. No hand or slug feeding of chlorine shall be permitted.
- (j) The acidity-alkalinity residual (PH factor) shall be maintained between 7.2 and 7.6. Testing devices capable of accurately measuring both the chlorine residual and the PH shall be provided.
- (k) The swimming pool shall be kept drained or covered with a cover capable of sustaining a 200 pound weight in any one location during the time when the house or residence is vacated or when the residents are away from the house for any extended period.
- (l) During water shortages, the filling of swimming pools shall be regulated by the Ordinance of the Village of Westwood for lawn sprinkling.
- (m) No swimming pool shall be drained during periods of excessive rainfall so as to overload the Village sewer system.
- (n) No person shall maintain a swimming pool on his premises without providing adequate supervision at all times when the pool is in use.

Section 6.01. Penalties. Any person who shall violate any provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and such violation shall be subject to a fine of not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or to imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than 90 days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court, together with the costs of prosecution. Uses carried on in violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be a nuisance and the owner or occupant shall be adjudged guilty of maintaining a nuisance per se, and such violation may be enjoined by injunction.

Section 7.01. Validity—Severing Clause. Sections of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be severable and should any section or provisions of this Ordinance be declared to be unconstitutional or invalid, the same shall not affect the part or parts not declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 8.01. Effective Date. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall become effective immediately upon publication.

Made and passed by the Village Council of the Village of Westwood, this 21st day of July, A.D. 1958.
