

Franklin Firemen to Tell Need for \$1,000 Donation

SOUTHFIELD — When council president John Hollywood asked Mayor Don Swanson to arrange for two members of the Franklin Fire department to come to a council meeting soon to explain why they need a \$1,000 donation for stand-by service, councilman C. Hugh Dohoney said that he couldn't see a need for the visit.

DOHANEY SAID that a conference with city attorney James Allen had convinced him that the city could not contribute money to a private organization. Furthermore, said Dohoney, the Franklin fire department had already gotten a \$1,000 donation from Southfield township.

"That's right," said attorney Allen, "but the city can make a contract for the stand-by service. There's a difference."

Councilman Emanuel Christensen said that Franklin was depending upon the donation from Southfield to keep their volunteer department solvent and that he did not want to renege because the money had been allocated in the budget. He went on to say that he was not satisfied that fire rates would not be changed if the service was discontinued.

DOHANEY CALLED for a vote on a tabulated resolution presented by him when the question of the \$1,000 first came up. In effect the resolution called for a free agreement with Franklin. Dohoney wanted to add the \$1,000 to unallocated surplus.

This resolution was defeated, and Mayor Swanson will arrange the meeting with the representatives of the Franklin Fire Department.

He said there were "many discrepancies" in the plans as approved by Charles Kelley, and that it would take many hours of work with the A & P architect to solve drainage and other problems. Work was to have started on the store this week.

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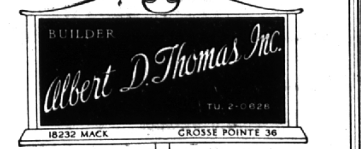
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
