Chief Tells How You Can Keep Burglars Away

There's a burglary a minute in the United States if you don't want to add to the statistics, Birmingham police chief Ralph W. Moxley has some tips for you.

The trick is to make your home look as if you're in it.

Newspapers, milk bottles, stacks of mail are a dead give-away. Either have deliveries stopped or arrange to have a neighbor collect them from your front stoop.

LEAVE a light or two on, and don't pull all the shades and blinds. An automatic timer is good, Moxley said, to turn lights on and off each evening.

Untended grass is another clue to the burglar who knows your tidier habits. A neighbor with a different vacation schedule might trade lawn mowing and sidewalk sweeping services for your mutual protection. Moxley adds that a locked door is a good idea even when you just hop next door for coffee—there are matinee burglars too.

NEVER leave your garage door open to tell the world the car is gone, Moxley says, and certainly don't leave ladders and tools around—they're as handy as a key to your door.

Lock up carefully—windows, including the second story, doors, garage, basement and porch, before you leave. Moxley adds that a locked door is a good idea even when you just hop next door for coffee—there are matinee burglars too.

Finally, Moxley says, don't tell the world you're leaving, but DO tell the police. The department will keep a closer watch on your property until you return to find everything fine.

Westchester Man Heads GM Plant Protection

Appointment of James D. Taylor as director of plant protection for General Motors has been announced.

The appointment was effective yesterday.

In his new position Taylor, 3265 Middlebury, Westchester, will be responsible for coordinating plant protection and fire prevention activities for General Motors divisions. He has been associate director of plant protection since Jan. 1, 1951.

He succeeds James E. Frederickson, who died June 6.

A native of Port Huron, Taylor joined General Motors as a plant protection patrolman with Chevrolet's gear and axle plant in Detroit in February 1938. He became cap-

tain of plant protection at the plant before entering the U. S. Army as lieutenant in October 1940. He advanced to the rank of colonel and while serving in the southwest Pacific was awarded numerous citations, including the legion of merit, bronze star and distinguished service star (Philip pines).

FOLLOWING HIS return from six years in the service, Taylor joined Chevrolet central office personnel relations. He remained with Chevrolet until being named associate director of plant protection in 1951.

Prior to beginning his career with an automotive firm in 1927, Taylor attended the University of Michigan for four years. He later attended Wayne university.
