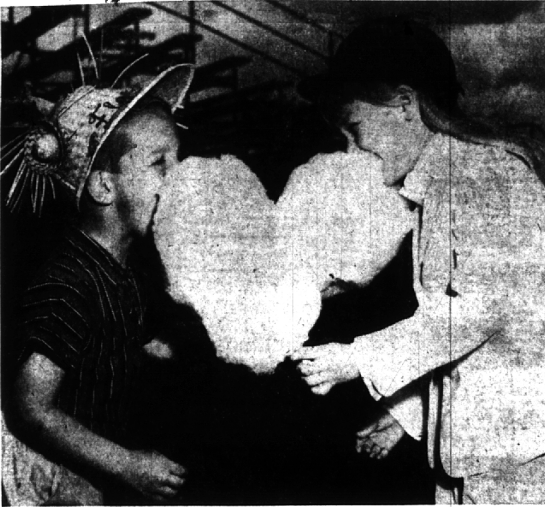

THE JUDGES attempt to ap-

praise the ability of the horse to perform under actual hunting conditions. For example, the hunter may clear every obstacle in stride at a fault and still be nowhere in the final judging. His jumping must not be too high, nor his pace too field. The ideal hunting performance is a smooth, even pace which clears obstacles in stride at a rate of speed the horse could maintain all day in the hunt-

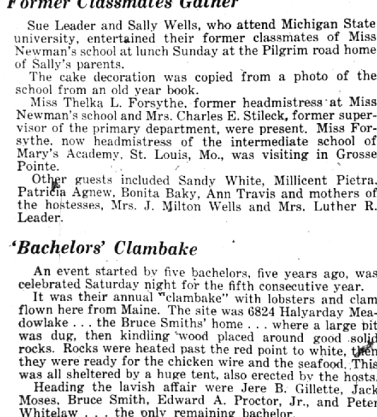
Tri Delta Alum's 70th Anniversary
