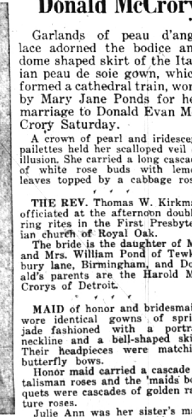
Harry Martin Swigert was best man. Seating the guests were John Milton Rogers and Theodore Watson.

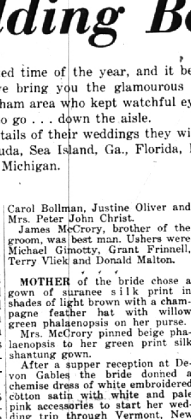
THE REV. Thomas W. Kirkman officiated at the afternoon double-ring rites in the First Presbyterian church of Royal Oak.

Sandra Parrish Walter Ebling

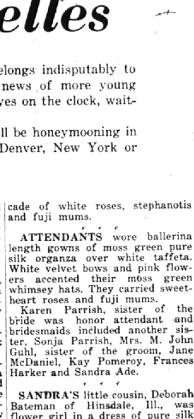

Attendants were waltz length white organza gowns over white taffeta with rounded necklines, short sleeves and princess line boners applied in garlands of lace.

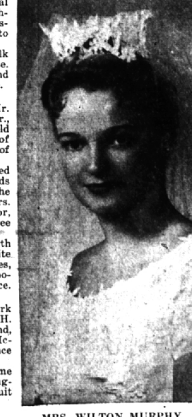
