nod on the state House ballot, attacked Michigan's present constitution and financing methods in a recent press statement.

He termed the constitution " antiquated" and said certain limitations imposed by it should be removed, "or Michigan will have serious problems in providing and financing services."

Mott said he had devised a plan to raise "millions of dollars for financing state services without taking any money from the people or corporations of Michigan."

"It is a justifiable tax that has been overlooked for a century because of powerful lobbying and timidity among some of our senile legislators," he said.

ROBERTS, a Pontiac lawyer, with a term of office already behind him, was House sponsor of the two-way stop school bus bill and co-sponsored the marine safety code, a counterpart to the state motor vehicle code applying to water travel.
