



Breathless "mothers" await diagnosis

Doll Hospital Has a Party For Patients and 'Mamas'

SOUTH BERKSHIRES—Paying high honor to all dolls, a unique celebration is now under way at the Laing doll hospital, business-like hobby of Mrs. Roger Parish, 30225 Woodhaven lane.

Hundreds of cherished dolls, and their little "mothers", are attending an "open house" doll birthday party at the doll hospital in Berkley, scheduled to last through June 21. The party marks the hospital's first year at its 12 Mile road location.

Because dolls are cared for as living things at the Laing hospital, young charmers attending the party with their favorite dolls, will come advice about their "children's" health as the "child nurse" on duty gives an examination and administers vitamins.

"Dr." Kay Parish, who handles most any case at her doll hospital, organized the "out-patient clinic" last January. Aware that nursing at home could prolong and save many doll lives, she began her project by accepting groups of youngsters each afternoon for training in "first aid."

In doll language "first aid" means handling the doll properly, bathing only when correctly done, using baby talc on certain dolls, keeping the hair well groomed and dressing the dolls in such a way as to keep the arms intact.

On tours through the hospital, Mrs. Parish shows the girls how she weaves human hair wigs for dolls and she also keeps on display china arms, legs and bodies which she fashions for disabled antique dolls. The children also visit the workshop where doll dresses and accessories are made.

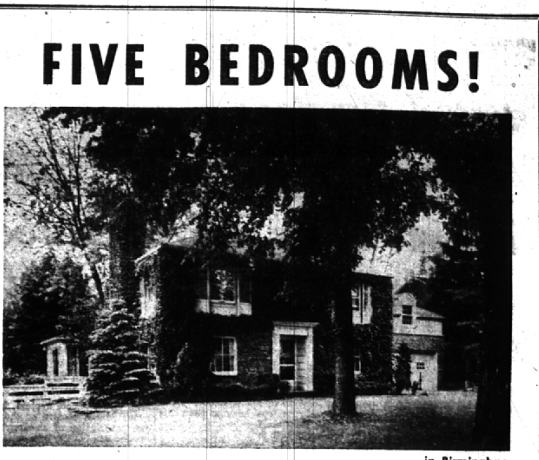
The 32 guests enjoyed cocktails on the terrace followed by buffet supper and party games.

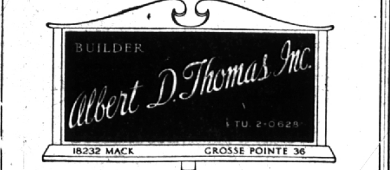

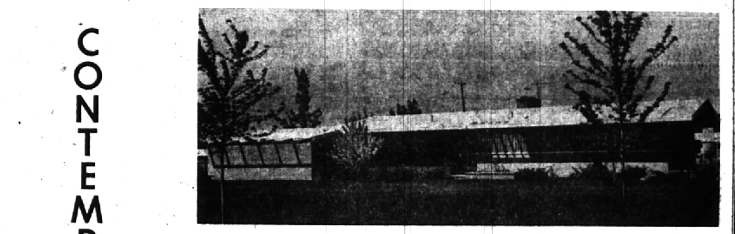

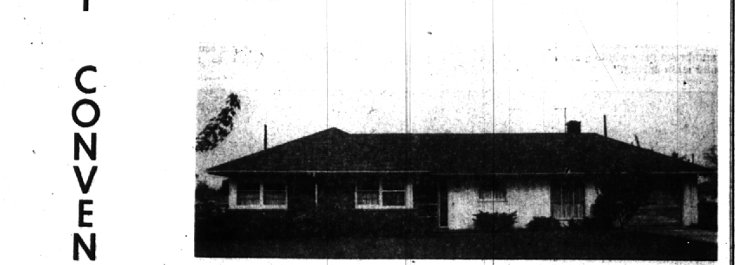
