Dinner Honors 3 Members

FRANKLIN — Wanda Fraser will be the only woman on the Franklin Volunteer fire department dinner tonight at Rosemond Hills inn. She has earned this somewhat enviable honor by serving the group as its chief dispatcher ever since a short wave communications system was set up.

Paying tribute to Wanda and her husband, Les, who has devoted many years as assistant fire chief, will be all the present and past volunteers and the commissioners. Bill Jones, retiring chief will also be a guest of honor.

The Frasers are vacating their posts shortly in preparation for moving from Franklin by July 1. They have operated the Franklin food shop for the past 17 years and have contributed their services to the protection of their community for almost as many years.

JONES' TENURE of service goes back even further. Among the early "bucket brigades", Jones served as chief since the formal organization of the department, often dropping his work as Franklin's postmaster to answer a fire call.

Arranging the details of the dinner was Bob Trudway chairman, with Harry Allen and Bill Worcester on the committee.

The fire department has purchased the site of the former community hall and expects to build new quarters adjacent to the present building. Plans have been accepted by the zoning commission.

No replacements have been named to fill the offices held by the Frasers and Jones.

Community Memory Disappears
A Symbol of Franklin

A half a century of community memories disappear under the relentless force of a wrecking crew. Franklin's historic community hall dismantled this week to make way for a new fire hall.

Damaged beyond repair by fire in January, the frame building could no longer serve as a community meeting place. Built near the turn of the century, the simple white building offered a place for square dances, plays, weddings, council meetings, scout meetings, Bible school, art classes and Christmas and Halloween parties.

Generations of Franklinites wore the piney floors smooth and jarred the plaster loose and even though the foundation was crumbling and the structure listing—only a fire finally silenced its happy heart.

Built by the Franklin cemetery association and later deeded to the Franklin community association, the hall was a symbol of Franklin. While the crews were ripping away, Franklin hurried past hardly daring to look, it means to much to many.

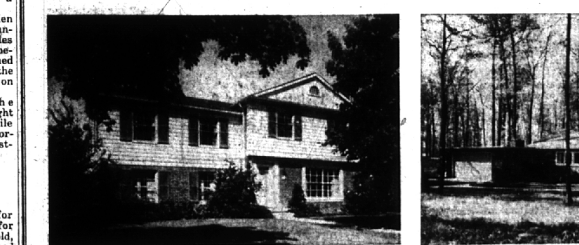
