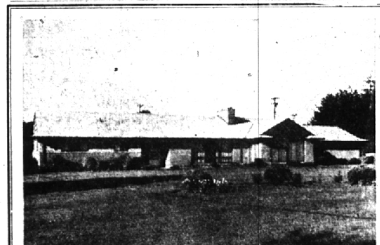

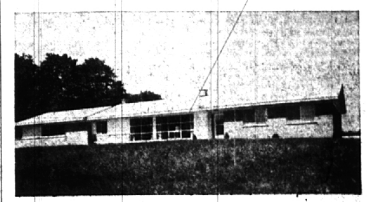

Thomas J. Grady, L. E. Snyder and Donald G. McNeff were proposed for the civil service commission for one, three and six year terms respectively.

The appointments were approved by C. Hugh Bohagay and O. David Edwards, Mrs. Jean McDonnell and Robert F. Wuerfel objected on the grounds that all three were of the same occupation, salesmen. Mrs. McDonnell said the charter specifically stated appointments were to be made "from all walks of life." Because T. Neil McGregor abstained and Emanuel Christensen had been excused early, the tie was broken by Hollywood, voting for the first time on a council issue. He approved the appointments, commenting that "it is a sad commentary on the citizens of Southfield that when asked to be applicants for civic posts nobody applied."

Grady was named chairman.

THE PROPOSED bond issue for a centrally located city hall, to house city offices, the municipal court and police station and a separate fire station will be presented to the council with a final budget Monday. If passed, the additional cost to the city, Swem's letter stated, would be \$38,000 yearly for 10 years.

The council referred petitions for roads and water totaling more than a quarter of a million dollars to Sven to prepare necessary plans and estimated costs.

In other actions, the council: Tabled until October all requests for liquor licenses.

Postponed consideration of a traffic code although a delegation from the Lee Baker drive area appeared.

Scheduled another special meeting—the third this week—to sweep up the ends of all the agencies as far as the meeting was to be held Wednesday.

Westwood Gets Zoning Ordinance

WESTWOOD—Councilmen unanimously passed the village's zoning ordinance Monday, changing labels for residential homes and the village's three bits of commercial property.

The ordinance becomes effective with its publication in The Eccentric today. It is on pages 2 and 3, section 2.

The law is essentially the same as the zoning for the area before it incorporated. The old zoning assigned residential-1 to areas with single family dwellings no smaller than 7,500 cubic feet. Because there were none in Westwood, this classification has been dropped and the old R-2 (10,000 cubic feet) becomes R-1. Other numbers have also been changed, but also without changing the restrictions in any way.
