Under the direction of the American Legion, the 21st annual Wolverine Boy's State will be held from June 19 to 26 at Michigan State university.

Designed as a program for the young citizens of America, its aims are to develop the responsibility of leadership, to prove the advantages of citizenship and to promote the art of clean sportsmanship.

More than 1,000 boys from all parts of Michigan will attend the eight-day program this year. Selected for their interest in government and the ability they have shown in this field, the group is first divided into political "parties" and then subdivided into cities of 50 boys each.

BOY'S STATE was set up to give the boys a chance to put into practice the theories of American government they learned in high school. The three divisions of government, judicial, legislative, and administrative, will be formed, and all boys will have a chance to serve for an office in the branch in which they are most interested.

Recreation, too, is included in the program. Boys will have full use of Michigan State's Jenison fieldhouse for all athletics. There are also organized softball and volleyball leagues for the athletic minded.

Then came the high point of the evening when Mr. Hoye announced the prefects for next year. Named for lower school prefects for the first semester are Mac McBride and Bill McCleary, for the second semester they are to be Ben Auran and Kim Morris. The regular Prefects to serve a full year, are to be Tom Bray, Doug Graham, Ron Roeder, Scott Romney and Ray Sokoloff. Senior prefects are John Butzel, Gary Cameron, Dave Colton, and Chick Cudip. The head prefect is Bill Williams.

The awards night Ceremony was then ended so that those boys who were going to Kingswood's commencement dance could leave.
