

### Franklin Council Takes Its Time

FRANKLIN—If time is the essence of many things, Franklin's council is unflinching about giving lots of it to current problems.

A third meeting has been called for next Monday night to polish off the revised building code which has been dangling on the agenda for the last two Mondays.

Referring to work overtime, rather than to pass legislation in a haphazard manner, the village fathers agreed to devote a full evening to the discussion of this single item. Interested parties are urged to attend June 23 in the youth room of the church at 7:30 p.m. and present their views BEFORE the code is adopted.

DISPOSITION of the proposed food ordinance was also delayed this week to allow time for more careful study. It is expected to reappear at the council table on June 14 and will affect all places of business serving or handling food.

Councilman Cal Thomas questioned the need for such legislation, but was reminded that three establishments within the village were serving food daily to the public.

Councilman Eugene Kaweci was also instructed to make further study of the village's need for traffic control signs. Action on proposed "No Turn" signs for Evelyne avenue, a heavily traveled street, will be taken on the kind of control and costs for proper signs could be ascertained.

### Woodcreek Argues Minimum Lot Sizes

WOODCREEK FARMS—What size lots should be in Woodcreek got a thorough going over Tuesday as the village council held a public hearing on a proposed zoning ordinance.

Biggest discussion centered around the most lenient designation, residential 3, setting 20,000 square feet as the minimum lot size. The smallest lot in Woodcreek now is about 27,500 square feet.

In Farmington township, which includes Woodcreek, the most stringent lot size requirements are equivalent to the most lenient in Woodcreek's proposed law.

WATSON KINNEY, chairman of the planning commission said his committee wanted to be reasonable and not impose hardships on property owners who hold large sections of undeveloped land in the mile square village.

Councilmen Zar Reader, Harry Dobson and Harry Lang, Jr., each indicated that hardship cases could be appealed and that minimum sizes should be at least comparable to existing lots.

A tentative compromise was set at 25,000 square feet with a 40-foot set-back from the center of the road, 10-foot side yards and 15,000 cubic foot content for dwellings in the R-3 zone.

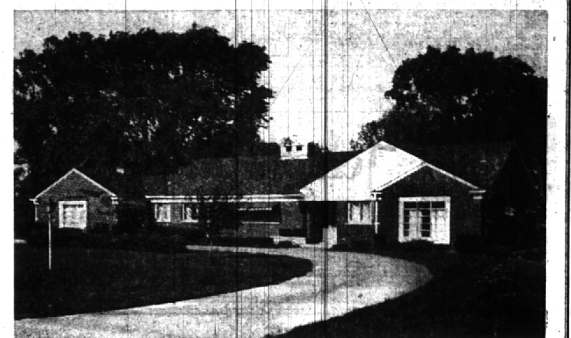
R-1 stipulates a 44,000 square foot lot minimum and R-2, \$30,000.

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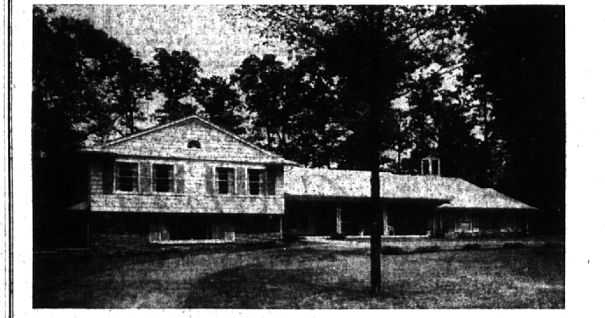

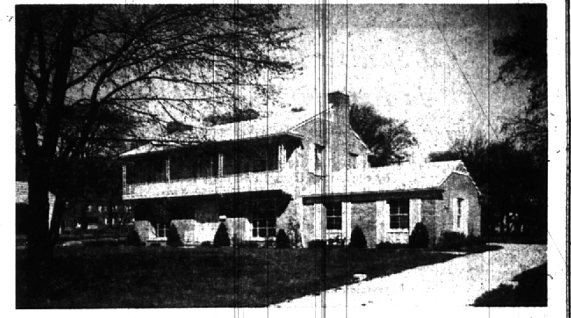

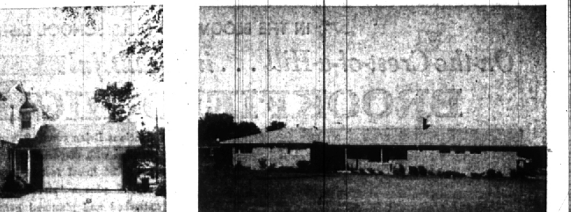
