

### Cornerstone to Get Its Third Location

The historic cornerstone of the Sacred Heart will be laid Sunday in its third location—the new school on Kemington road in Bloomfield Hills.

The stone bears three dates—1867, 1918 and 1955, marking the locations of the school. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Eugene E. Paddock, pastor of Holy Name church in Birmingham, will officiate at the 2:30 p.m. ceremony Sunday, and the Rev. Francis T. Stack, pastor of St. Hugo of the Hills church, Bloomfield Hills, will speak.

Msgr. Paddock will also unveil and bless a statue of the Sacred Heart which will be opposite the front of the new school.

### Washington Trip Brought Indians Little Happiness

How the Ottawa Indians of Michigan set off in a canoe for Washington to see the Great Father after possession of their lands is recorded in material in the University of Michigan historical collections.

The events, related by Andrew Blackbird, son of an Ottawa chief, was a vivid childhood memory. Blackbird, who lived near Little Traverse bay, was educated by a mission conducted by French missionary priests.

He wrote: "Up to 1835 and sometime afterwards there was a large double cedar tree standing near the edge of the water and leaning steeply toward the surface, somewhat like a staircase projecting far out over the bay."

"In the fall of 1835 I was clear at the top of this tree with my little chums, watching our people as they were going to Washington to see the Great Father, the President of the United States, to tell him to have mercy on the Ottawa and Chippewa Indians in Michigan, not to take all the land away from them.

"I saw some of our Indian women weeping as they watched our principal men going off in the canoe. I expect they were feeling bad on account of not knowing their future destinies respecting their possession of the land."

"AFTER THEY all got in the canoe, just as they were going to start, they all took off their hats, crossed themselves and repeated the Lord's Prayer. Then crossing themselves again, they went towards Harbor point. We watched them until they disappeared in rounding the point."

Blackbird related that in March, 1836, a treaty was signed in Washington, against the will of the Indians, to be given \$150,000 worth of drygoods till all was

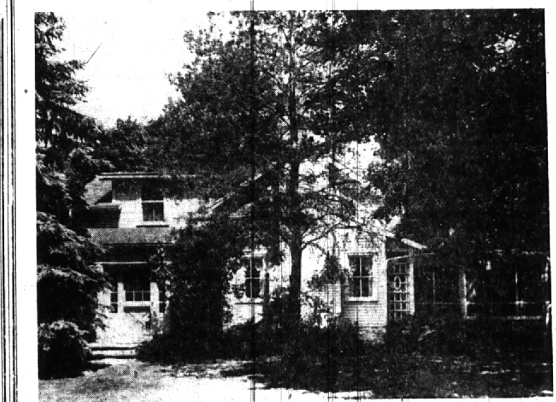
