PRECEDENTS COULD BE SMASHED IN WOMEN'S OPEN

Four major precendents in women's golf history could be roken at Bloomfield township's Forest Lake country club

The USGA Women's Open has never been won by the same goffer two years in succession. But Betsy Rawls, the 1987 champ, is given a good chance of repeating this summer. And if she does repeat, the golfing world will have its first four-time Women's Open champion. Miss Rawls has won it three times, as did the late and great Babe Didrikson Zaharias.

NEVER HAS A SWEEP of the two major women's tournaments—the Ladies' PGA and the Women's Openbeen registered But those in the know aren't excluding young Mickey Wright, the '58 LPGA queen, from their choices of top contenders for this weekend's crown.

And never has an amateur captured first in the Women's Open. But very, very prominent in the ranks of the gals registered at Forest Lake is the name of Barbara McIntire, 22-year-old Floridan. Miss McIntire came the closest any mateur has of winning the classic of all women's golf classics. She tied with Kathy Cornelius at the end of 72 loles in the 1956 tourney at Duluth, Minn, losing by seven strokes in the 18-hole playoff.

A FIELD OF 57 of this country's finest gal golfers—29 professionals and 28 amateurs—opens play this morning on the 6,240-yard par-73 Forest Lake course, each of the 57 are previous Women's open titlists—Miss Rawls, Fay Crocker, Kathy Cornelius, Patty Berg, Betty Jameson and Louise Suga.
