Drive for Funds

WESTCHESTER — The drive to raise funds for street signs in areas similar to those already erected in Westchester, has been going extremely well. Bob Bogar, assessor reports the amount collected represents about 70 per cent of the money needed for the project.

Bloomfield Hills elementary and high school testing programs were reviewed for the board of education and interested members of the citizens' educational advisory group Tuesday.

To compare the district with other similar residential districts, rather than with national norms, the board requested the administration to check ratings with schools in 18-20 similar districts taking the same tests.

It also directed Superintendent Eugene Johnson to obtain information about joining the Educational Records Bureau testing program, which checks ratings with various public and private school norms.

The board emphasized that no fault was being found with present testing program.

MRS. KAY FLINT, elementary supervisor, explained a new testing program to be used for one year on a trial basis in the elementary grades next year. It is a Metropolitan test with 500,000 students participating nationwide. She mentioned it covers science and social studies, which were not included in previous tests.


