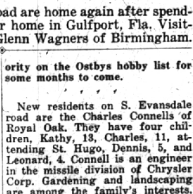
Assisting Mrs. White, as co-chairman of the tea, is Mrs. F. F. Stebbins. Past presidents of the Garden Center and honorary members will pour.
