## Indian Graves Yield Ancient Treasures

LATHRUP — A lively interest in archeology was cultivated at the age of 7 for C. F. Wolgast when his father discovered an old white Indian arrow on their property.

Since then, Wolgast, who lives at 18744 Sunnybrook, has amassed some 10,000 arrow heads and is able to identify each one individually.

He has opened 302 Indian graves and uncovered such treasures as a hatchet over 1,000 years old and an ancient vessel believed to be at least 3,000 years old.

Included in his vast collection valued at \$30,000, are Inca pipes, Aztec sacrificial knives, which were used to cut out human hearts, fish hooks, shovels, grinders, chisels and items made of black basalt.

His only purchased item is a huge totem pole attached to a recreation wall over shelves of burial urns, carved images and cooking vessels.

Underneath these shelves are 360 skulls which Wolgast has unearthed. He can tell the height of the Indian, sex, and even the cause of death, by studying these skulls.

All but eight or nine items in his collection were found within a 40-mile radius of Detroit. He has even found Indian graves in the 15 Mile and Southfield areas.

Of the rarer items, Wolgast has obtained two of the three known Indian spatulas.

AMONG HIS other hobbies are German beer steins, which were brought over to this country by his family and are at least 120 years old.

He also has a vast array of guns which includes a set of 18th century dueling pistols with ivory handles that are enclosed in a solid mahogany case. — MARION EILER.
