Lathrup Woman's Club Active 19 Years

LATHRUP — As the Lathrup Woman's club made plans for its luncheon and card party in the house-in-the-woods March 19—to be highlighted by a hat show—its first president, Mrs. Earl M. Doig, did some reminiscing about the club's early days.

"How smoothly the club runs today," commented Mrs. Doig as she recalled the first meeting of the club 19 years ago. About 35 women attended that meeting.

With Mrs. Howard J. Stock and Mrs. James Fowler, the two women held a tea at Lathrup school to organize a mothers' club. Many of the women had expressed their interest in a Lathrup Woman's club and since their first

meeting, the club has been known as just that.

THEIR FIRST BIG project was to purchase a typewriter for school and club use. Little by little through teas and parties, the members raised money for books for the school library. A few dollars here and a few there and they purchased a mimeograph machine. Then they bought dark shades for the gymnasium and piece by piece they furnished playground equipment.

At the January 1958 meeting the club was able to approve a \$500 appropriation to finance their new library project.

Early club meetings were held in Lathrup school. To save money all announcements and notices were delivered by mothers and carloads of children to do the running and jumping in and out of cars. At that time all the telephones were five-party lines and a phone call was a major undertaking.

TODAY THE CLUBS more than 250 members receive notice of special events by mail once a month. Meetings are held in the house-in-the-woods, a huge house owned by Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Kelley. Mrs. Kelley, the former Louise Lathrup, has made the Woman's club the envy of every club in Wayne or Oakland County because the club pays no rent or lease bills for the unlimited use of the big house.

Kitchen use rules have been posted in the house-in-the-woods and committees oversee them carefully. After monthly teas or card parties, the equipment is left in immaculate order. A house committee supervises the laundering of linens and monthly cleaning.

SINCE THEIR FIRST project at the school, the club has widened its horizons. Girl scouts receive support to organize new troops and special projects. Every year the club, The Goodfellows, are given assistance and donations are
