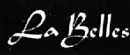

Have you seen Mrs. Jankie spin yet? This is the question the children ask each other as they pass her room at Greenfield school, near 13 Mile road in Southfield township. Those that answer "no" start urging their teacher to have Mrs. Jankie in. The children are fascinated as they see the mass of flax fibers slowly emerge as linen thread. Some of the rooms are studying clothing and have many questions ready. Where does flax grow? Is it a plant, a bush, or a tree? Mrs. Jankie willingly describes the blue-flowered fields that she had so often seen in Poland. Each child then had an opportunity to look at the wheel closely and watch the various parts moving. In the machine age of today very few children get such a worthwhile picture of how the pioneers had to make all their clothing.

MRS. EDWARD C. CODNER, Town Hall program co-chairman, supplies the following excerpts from the letter with which today and tomorrow's Town Hall speaker Richard Armour answered her request for more biographical material: "It all started with my father and mother. I was born in San Pedro, Calif., July 15, 1906 and was very young for several years. I was graduated from Pomona college in 1927 and went to Harvard, where I took a Ph.D. in English philology and 25 years later can still live up a dull party by quoting the Lord's Prayer in Gothic. (Now that the Goths have died out, there are very few of us left who can do this). About the time I took a Ph.D. I took a wife and education began in earnest. Our union (which is labelled unaffiliated with the AFL or the CIO) has been blessed with two children, a son and a daughter. Most of my life has been spent on or near a college campus. What my students have learned, I do not know, but I have taught English literature at such exotic places as the University of Freiburg, Germany (during Hitler's first year in power), the University of Hawaii, and others. For seven summers I took parties to Europe, badly-hooped in the buses and taking people through churches and art museums when they could hardly wait to go shopping. I have managed to write sixteen books and innumerable magazine pieces in prose and verse. I shall probably write until I die, but not a day after."
