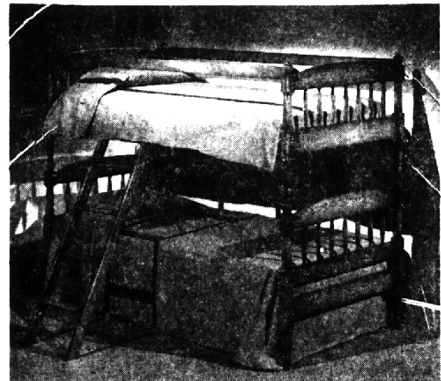
Check your stored bulbs. Remove the shriveled and rotted ones and revise your storage system. Kill CHICKWEED now with WEED-B-GON.

A California policeman saw some nice seedlings in his garden and cultivated them carefully. They turned out to be 5 ft. marijuana plants. Oh, me!

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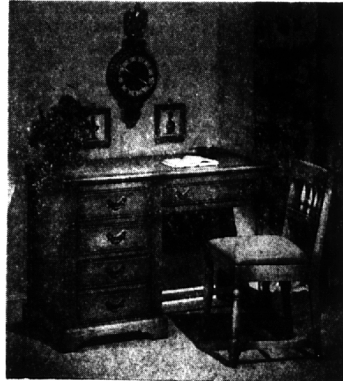


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
