State conservation department publications recently received two of the three annual publication awards of the American Wildlife Society. "Red Foxes of Michigan" was named the best popular conservation publication of the year. Technical field honors went to "Michigan Prairie Grasses" publication. "The Life and Times of Michigan Pheasants," received the society's award in life interest. Persons can obtain a copy of the fox book by contacting the conservation department.

January bounty payments in Michigan totaled \$5,850, including \$720 for 1,544 foxes. Hunters and trappers collected for 86 coyotes and 93 bobcats.

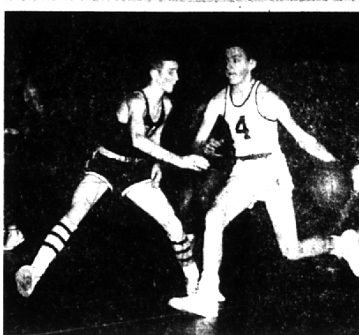
Michigan will not have an early rainbow trout fishing season this year. Sea lamprey depredations have seriously reduced steelhead spawning populations, which formerly preceded the regular April trout opener, has been abandoned to give the "bows" a better opportunity to spawn.

Ice fisherman Robert Smock of Grayling had an unexpected visitor while spearing at Timber Lake in Crawford county. Smock reports he was drawing in the line that held his live-decoy when he felt a tug. Reading his spear, he was all set to throw when an other suddenly appeared in the fishing hole. The other must have been as surprised as the fisherman, for it let go of the line and disappeared under the ice.

"Muzzleless" a new motion picture dealing with gun safety, is now available from the Michigan conservation department for showings by schools, sportsmen's clubs and other groups. The 10-minute color sound film, produced by the New Hampshire fish and game department, uses a new approach to promote shooting as a safe sport. Puppets are used to depict the basic causes of hunting accidents. The movie can be obtained without charge from the conservation department's film loan service.

Three Saginaw area men recently used a ferret to assist them in bagging 10 cottontail rabbits near Rose City in Ogemaw county. It cost them \$175 in fines and an additional \$23.40 in court costs after they were apprehended by a game warden. The use of ferrets, members of the weasel family, is a very effective—but illegal—method of driving rabbits from their holes.

Black ducks are noted for their ability to avoid hunters' guns, and a male of this species at Pointe Mouillee on Lake Erie is living proof. Originally trapped and banded by conservation department game workers in 1949, this duck has skillfully and luckily avoided death in a flyway heavily populated by hunters. It was an adult when banded, indicating it is at least nine years old at present. Since it was first banded, the bird has been retrapped 15 times—setting some sort of a record. The drake wasn't captured in 1950, 1952 or 1957 but was trapped nine times during 1955. Latest ap-
