



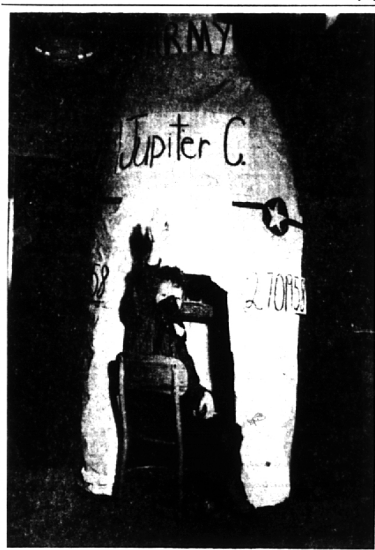
### 300 Pupils From Barnum Assist Play

fleet has been rebuilt, the gross national income reached \$39 billion in 1955. Obligations and reparations caused by the war have been met and the German car industry has reached the second place in world car production.

This fact like others, shows clearly the economic advances since 1945—namely, that the German people and their government have now gained the confident partnership of the free world.

EVERYTHING I said above applies indeed to only one portion of Germany—the Federal Republic. It includes around one-half of the former Germany. It also applies to West Berlin, an island of a free world 100 miles behind the front curtain which still runs through the middle of Germany. It is only in these two parts of Germany that the German people have had their sovereignty restored. Elsewhere, freedom has been suppressed or foreign states have taken over territory unlawfully after drawing out the German population.

The Germans know that it does not lie entirely in their power to change this situation. Nevertheless, they agree that the nations of the free world that the whole world will only reach a relaxation
