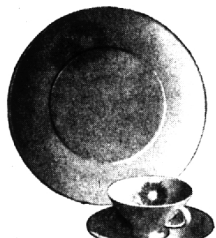

# PROCRASTINATION CHARGES DOUBLE

You have lost precious time!

- From the looks of some lawns the grass has begun to grow. From now on be careful of burning it. Three solutions are recommended:
  - Water the fertilizer of the grass blades after each 50 or 100 lbs. have been applied.
  - Use a more expensive material (but just as good, if not better) which is non-burning.
  - Use organic fertilizers such as sludge, Dri-cone, etc. (these are a great deal more expensive).
- Whatever you decide to use the material should contain 10 lbs. of nitrogen per 100 lbs. of fertilizer.
- Dormant spraying should be done NOW. However, our own lilyacs have well swelled, green buds and we will have to dilute the SCALECID (which, as we said before, stinks and stains—but is efficient), get going on all shrubs and trees which do not show signs that sprigs-ear.
- FERTILIZER SPREADERS—Do you believe we would be wise to have 48 spreaders to loan to people? If you do you are nuts. We do have quite a few available for this purpose. If Saturday had an alter-ego such as Tuesday and Wednesday we'd be in good shape.

If you need a spreader and don't want to own a LAWN BEAUTY, reserve a loaner one week to 10 days ahead of time—along with your fertilizer.

- (Without the fertilizer there is not much chance of getting one—obviously).
- Are we through with PROCRASTINATION.
  - If you sow your GRASS SEED (WOOD-RUFFS) now SHE won't confront you with this task just as you are setting forth for your first round of golf.
  - If she does confront you get a small CYCLONE SEEDER and satisfy HER and ALSO play golf.
  - Start your tomato, petunia and other more difficult plants from seeds by using PERMANEST PLANT FRAYS and STARTER TEXTS and even LIGHTS and TIMERS if you are in the 2,300 dollar income bracket.

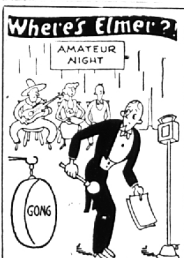
