

## Four Area Folk Named to Unit's Exec Committee

Four Birmingham area residents have been named to the executive committee for the newly organized Detroit unit of Recording for the Blind, Inc.

The committee are John L. McQueen, 1395 Willow Lane, Birmingham; H. Gray Muzzy, 180 Lowell Court, Bloomfield Hills; Geoffrey Strelinger, 294 Linden, Birmingham; and Mrs. Gene A. White, 767 Suffolk, Birmingham. Strelinger has been elected chairman of the committee.

Purpose of Recording for the Blind, Inc. is to make textbooks and technical data available to blind college and vocational students. This national organization, with headquarters in New York, maintains a most file of "textbooks" dictated by volunteer workers in local units throughout the country.

"We urgently need more volunteers for reading and checking the tapes," states Strelinger. "This work is done by volunteers, and relies upon volunteers, opens a whole new world to the three out of four blind college students who are unable to read Braille."

Which means, of course, that members opposed to Routhier's plan have no public voice in the UAW's policies.
