The chapter is a new one and was welcomed to the group by State President Mrs. Paul Freethum at a tea held in the Women's City club of Detroit.

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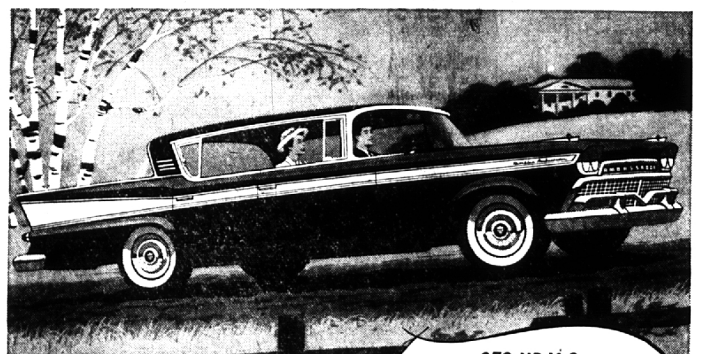
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
