



## One New Name on Bingham Ballot

**BINGHAM FARMS** — Neil E. Warren, unopposed candidate for councilman, will be the only new comer on the Bingham Farms council, after the election Monday, but he's no newcomer to government. Warren, 48, served briefly as mayor of Pleasant Ridge after the death of its mayor in 1947.

Warren seeks the vacancy left by William King's decision not to run again. King, a charter commission member and councilman since the village incorporation, will vacate a three year post.

An architect for the Detroit Edison company, Warren moved to 32721 Bingham lane in late 1957 after he had served on the Farmdale-Pleasant Ridge Community board, the Pleasant Ridge City Planning commission and two terms on the Pleasant Ridge city commission.

**INCUMBENTS** John H. Longley and James McGuire are unopposed in seeking re-election to the other council seats.

Longley, a sales engineer for Bobcock and Wilcox and a Yale graduate, has lived at 32851 Bingham road for six years and has already served two years on the village council. He has three sons, McGuire, father of five children, has been a resident of Bingham Farms for nine years and lives at 25500 W. 13 Mile road. He owns the McGuire Lumber company in Dearborn and has been on the council since incorporation.

**RUNNING** without opposition for the third term as village clerk is Mrs. Josie Cobwell, 32814 Bingham lane.

Also unopposed is Hyakell E. Wright, who seeks re-election as treasurer. The Wrights have three daughters and live at 31700 Telegraph. Wright is a certified public accountant and a graduate of Wayne. He was appointed treasurer in 1956 to complete the term vacated by James Barrett, who resigned last year.

Walter J. Gerick, assessor since 1955, is unopposed for another term. He lives at 23101 Sugar creek and has two sons, Gerick is comptroller for Saco-Mobil Oil company.

The remaining members of the village council are Clyde Hawley,

president, Don Kiger and Evan Irem. They have another year to serve before their terms end.

**REGISTRATIONS** can still be made, late-comers are told. Mrs. Cobwell will be at Outland stables from 9 a.m. till 5 p.m. Saturday for the convenience of those who have not registered.

Voters who come to the polls on Monday, at Outland's stables, will also decide upon the proposed amendment to the charter.

It provides for relief from the strict road fund regulations and would allow the council to follow a new state law regarding funds for road construction and maintenance. The charter now requires a 1/2 vote of the electorate.

Bingham Farms has about 190 registered voters to date.
