Confronted with a birthday party for a three, four or five year old this spring? Why not try a "Finders Keepers" party? Children this age love an element of suspense and challenge and they are complete individualists so when you gear your party to their natural characteristics, they are bound to have fun.

Set this up for an out-door party and have it mainly on their ability to find pennies. In one corner of the porch or other appropriate place, make a small store by setting a low table there for the counter and possibly some book-case shelves against the wall for the store shelves.
