Bingham Budget Sets \$3,900 for Road Work

BINGHAM FARMS—The village council voted Monday just under the 3 mill limit on their \$1,394,260 worth of property to raise \$3,900 for road work. The budget adopted Monday also provides a general fund of \$2,740. Funds for this will come from state returns.

Police protection was omitted from the budget, President Clyde Hawley explained that state and county units were sufficient for the present.

The village expects to receive \$1,840 from state sales and tangible taxes. About \$900 is left in the general fund from the year just ending. Apparently the village is optimistic about its legal needs, cutting the item down to \$500.

THE COUNCIL agreed to stand pat on its present rubbish collection policy. It made no plans to consider the invitation of the Southeastern Oakland county garbage rubbish authority. Bingham farms allots \$884 of its general fund to a private rubbish collection.

William Hyland was asked to get details about building inspection from the new Southfield township board because new arrangements are necessitated by Southfield incorporation.

Hyland was charged with checking on an uncompleted home on Segar court which has been in the process of building for three years.

Evan Reim, road administrator, reported that hand work should be authorized for the valley of Bingham road and additional gravel would be needed. He said calcium chloride treatments would begin in June.

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Junior Firemen Boost Man-Power Of Franklin Unit

FRANKLIN—Boys 16 to 18 years old will be eligible to join the new Junior Franklin Volunteer firemen, an auxiliary unit, according to its organizer, Harry Allen of Franklin.

At a meeting today interested youths were told the organizational structure by fire commissioners Vernon Converse III, William Albee, Thomas Dudson and Allan.

Bob Bell, 20, a fully qualified volunteer fireman and a pre-medical student, will head the group. Members will be trained in giving assistance at fires.

The juniors must have the consent of their parents and will be required to maintain good grades at school and good deportment at all times, Allen said. They will be assigned to handling fire hoses, policing at fires, care of equipment, truck washing and other tasks to extend the man-power of the department.

Members will have helmets and green jumpers as uniforms.

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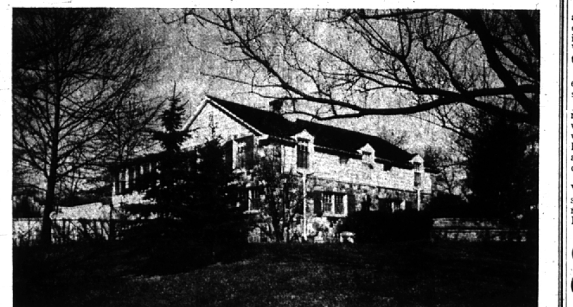
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
