Notice of Last Day of Registration of the Qualified Electors of Bloomfield Hills School District No. 2 County of Oakland, Michigan

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Please Take Notice that the Board of Education of Bloomfield Hills School District No. 2, County of Oakland, Michigan, has called an annual election to be held in said School District on June 9, 1958.

Section (532), Chapter 8, Part II, Act 269, Public Acts of Michigan, 1955, provides as follows:

"The inspectors of election at any annual or special election shall not receive the vote of any person residing in a registration school district whose name is not registered as an elector in the city or township in which he resides."

THE LAST DAY on which persons may register with the Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside in order to be eligible to vote at said annual election called to be held June 9, 1958, is Monday, June 2, 1958. Persons registering after 5:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on said Monday, June 2, 1958, are not eligible to vote at said annual election.

Under the provisions of Act 269, Public Acts of Michigan, 1955, registrations will not be taken by school officials, and only persons who have registered as general electors with the Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside are registered school electors. Persons planning to register with City and Township Clerks must ascertain the days and hours on which the Clerk's office is open for registration.
