NOTE one is given to them to start off. It might read, "From the porch to the lamp-post is not very far, so race to find out where other notes are."

On the lamp-post you have tied two which might read, "The next clue will be an old shoe. Just dash to the garage but don't expect a corsage." (Here you might have several old shoes in sight and they must locate the note tucked in the toe of one.)

This note reads, "Now pick up the scent as to the mailbox you're bent." The note in the mailbox says, "Away we go and not too slow, for around the house we've trapped not a mouse... but..."

Somewhere on the ground, in the back of the house, you have placed a mouse-trap in which is clipped the note.

This note says, "Now look through the grass which is sprinkled with coins. When you have found three you may look for a

tree. What tree? A treasure tree... WHOOPEE!"

BEFORE the party you have prepared about a dollar's worth of pennies through the grass of the back yard. After they have found the treasure tree, you may tell them to go back to the grass and find the rest of the coins.

Before the party, equip an old trunk with all kinds of dress-up materials such as old dresses, skirts, blouses, hats, purses, shoes, beads and jewelry, men's pants, jackets, etc. Have it in the basement, garage, or some specific place where they can dive into it and proceed to dress up.
