### Bloomfield Denies Water Extension

BLOOMFIELD — The township board Monday night rejected a request from Ralph H. Scheel to extend the Bloomfield water system to the area near Huntington Valley subdivision.

Officials said the township's present water supply was too inadequate for any extension.

The board also referred to the zoning board of appeals a request for a zoning change to commercial property on the east side of Telegraph south of Maple. The request had been previously rejected by the township zoning board. Township trustees said they had no authority to change zoning.

THE RESIGNATION of Roland C. Koehler from the zoning board was accepted. Koehler, 4890 Charing Cross, has been a member of the group since March 1955. No replacement has yet been named.

### Burglars Break In Bloomfield Homes

BLOOMFIELD — Two cases of breaking and entering were reported Monday to Bloomfield township police last weekend.

An estimated \$500 in articles and books were stolen from the home of Glenn Sleser, 1400 N. Glen-garry, while the family was away Tuesday to Burton.

Taken were 25 silver dollars, gift certificates, small radios and two watches.

The home of C. J. Boldt, 340 S. Williamsburg, was ransacked Friday night. Three watches and an undetermined number of rolls of pennies were taken.

### Bids Are Opened For High School Stage Equipment

SOUTHFIELD — Bids were open for high school stage equipment, furnishing for the high school cafeteria addition and bleachers for Lederer school gymnasium at the regular meeting of Southfield board of education Monday. Contracts will be awarded at special session Monday.

A debt of many years' standing was cleaned up when the board voted to accept \$800 from the county road commission for property on Southfield near City. The road taken over by the commission when Southfield road was cut through.

A CHECK of school property deeds recently revealed that no payment had been made for the property, which the commission had acquired prior to the district's consolidation 11 years ago. The present board then made the claim to the road commission.

The board also voted to seek a school site in section 16. Its attorney was authorized to apply to the state finance commission to sell \$1,000,000 in bonds in view of good interest rates prevailing. This is the fourth million authorized in the district's \$4,000,000 expansion program.

An eighth step was added to the salary schedule of 12 non-degree teachers, giving an \$100 increase at maximum. The schedule for non-degree teachers now ranges from \$3,500 to \$4,900.

### Bloomfield Crash Hurts 4 Seriously

BLOOMFIELD — Four persons were seriously injured Saturday in a two-car crash at Telegraph and Ward roads. Two others suffered minor injuries.

In poor condition at St. Joseph Mercy hospital, Pontiac, is Mrs. Almada Mitchell, 85, of Keego Harbor, with a fractured skull. Her husband, Andrew, 87, is in fair condition there with chest injury.

Two passengers in the car Mitchell was driving are in satisfactory condition at Pontiac General hospital. They are Golden Grant, 55, and Theresa Czernek, 12, both of Detroit.

State police said Mitchell rammed into a car driven by Frank Polasek, 63, Auburn Heights, as she waited to turn. Polasek and his wife, Alice, were treated for minor injuries.

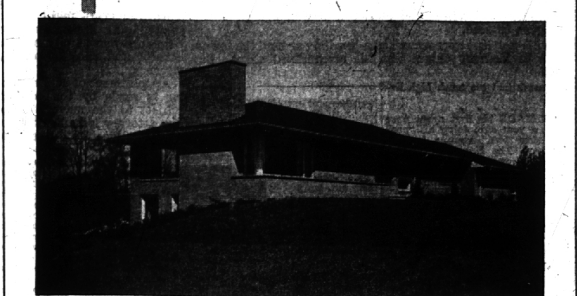
