Landscaping Bids Rejected by Hills School Board

Landscaping recommendations and backstop bids were studied by Bloomfield Hills board of education Tuesday night.

The board awarded a contract for landscape work at Eastover school and its addition under construction to Harry White and Sons, low bidder at \$4,483.

It rejected the high bid for landscaping of the new Pine Lake school and asked the two low bidders to re-bid. It decided to study its overall financial situation before determining extent of landscape work at the new junior high school.

TWO BIDS

were received for blacktopping of parking lots and drives at Hickory Grove and Pine Lake schools and of a recreation area at the rear door of Vaughan school. Action was delayed until the over-all study could be made.

A progress report from Charles MacMahon, architect, showed Eastover addition to be ahead of schedule and Pine Lake and the junior high to be slightly behind. MacMahon said all will be ready for occupancy when school opens Sept. 3.

Junior high school costs may exceed expectations by about \$6,000, MacMahon reported, as a result of well difficulties. The well is located 275 feet farther away from the school than planned. However, a change in the type of library chairs and conversion to open bays will save about \$1,328.
