Saturday they met the Lieberts' friends at a cocktail party.

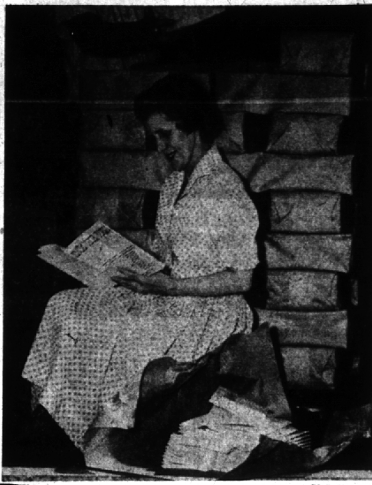
Birmingham Village school music festival, Spring Fantasy, was held May 13.
