FRANKLIN—For the first time in over a decade, Franklin will have a local candidate appearing on the June ballot for representation on the Birmingham school board.

Running for one of the two four-year terms will be Richard Bernard of Wellington road, Barman, 33, and father of Colby, 9, and Robbie, 6, is a lawyer for GM and received his primary and secondary schooling in Buffalo, N. The fifth grade chose the museum at Greenfield Village to visit.

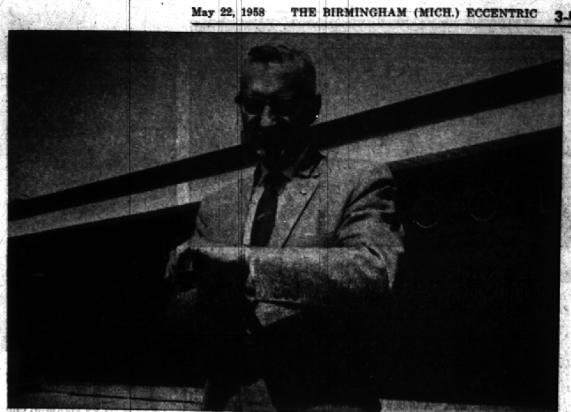
The first and second grades are planning an opera, "The Magic Feather of Mother Goose" May 28.

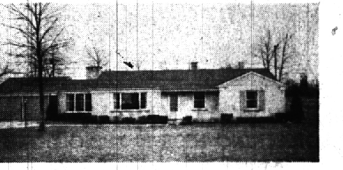
