## Anyone for Music?

FOXCROFT—If you like music (and who doesn't!) just stop around Foxcroft any weekend and you'll hear the best there is, played the way you like it on absolutely superb hi-fi equipment.

With a library of more than 1,000 discs and tapes, and more than \$2,000 worth of high fidelity equipment, Bill and Bob Coxon have a good start towards realizing their goal in life. The 21-year-old Coxon twins, sons of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Coxon of Sandy Lane, plan eventually to form their own recording company.

At present they are using their bedroom as a recording studio. The hi-fi equipment that almost fills the room includes five microphones, two recorders, two mixers, a coaxial speaker, turntable, professional FM tuner and two 30-watt amplifiers. It won't be long before the boys will have to go to make room for the music.

And as far as what you might like to hear goes—you name it and they have it. Any type of music from the latest in rock 'n' roll to the classics, even sound effects.

Bill and Bob have always liked music, but it wasn't until they were stationed in France with the Army that they purchased their first records. They assisted at 17, and before they returned home last September, they had already worn out two recorders, purchased two more and sent masses of equipment home.

New students at Ferris Institute, they spend every weekend at the home recording in their studio bedroom.

Stereophonic sound is the next step. The Coxon twins hope to earn enough money this summer to buy this equipment. They will furnish sound effects, public address equipment, and music for parties and dances upon any group's request.

In France the boys were often asked to furnish background music for garden parties. They devised a clever method of getting "the most out of their speakers by placing one in an empty water tower and the other in a cave, creating an echo for a perfect effect.

When they finish studies at Ferris, Bill and Bob plan to study the reproduction of sound, attending college together. Then they hope to form their long dreamed-of recording company.—KAROL DARLING.
