

Local Achievers to Share In Future Unlimited Gala

One hundred and ten Achievers and 8 Junior Achievement companies from Birmingham will play a major part in JA's wind-up affair, Future Unlimited Celebration, at University of Detroit Memorial Building May 15.

The end-of-the-year JA event, a tribute to all southeastern Michigan Achievers, was arranged by leading business, industrial, civic and educational leaders in conjunction with Junior Achievement of Southeastern Michigan, Inc.

The two-hour Future Unlimited Celebration starts at 8 P.M. Tickets are available to the public at \$4 each and can be purchased from JA Headquarters, 14812 Grand River Detroit.

FOR THE FIRST time since it was inaugurated in 1949, the Future Unlimited Celebration will be a political-type convention format, with JA firms identified by placards or signs on the main arena floor. Achievers and their companies will be the stars of the show which is expected to fill the 8,000 seat Memorial Building.

Over 100 JA Awards will be given to outstanding Achievers and JA companies by various business, industrial and civic leaders.

In a fast moving and entertaining show, this year's Future Unlimited will accommodate all participants of Achievers, contributors and stockholders in JA plus advisers to JA firms for the first time.

STARS FROM New York, Seattle, Hollywood and Las Vegas will highlight the entertainment side of the program, with the master of ceremonies of The 654,000 Question television show, Hal March, acting as M. C.

Five Birmingham area pupils received high awards in last week's metropolitan Detroit science fair at the state fair grounds.

Second place in the biology division went to an 18-year-old Birmingham high school student, Ronald E. Hines, 335 S. Cranbrook, Bloomfield township. His project dealt with experiments with harmless bacteria. He built his own X-ray machine, colorimeter and culture box.

Third place in the general science division went to Derby junior high pupil, Elizabeth Meese, 14, of 2775 Pine Hill. Troy placed eighth with an exhibit of prenatal development. Joan Franklin, 15, of 21027 Thirteen Mile, Franklin, was 10th with an exhibit centering around the human eye and ear.

THIRTEENTH PLACE in the science division went to a ninth grader at Southfield's Lederle junior high, George Garland, 14, of Detroit. His exhibit was a Van deGraff generator.

Another Detroit youth, William Smith, 16, a junior at Detroit Country Day, placed 13th in chemistry with an exhibit of molybdenum compounds.

Graduation Speaker Is Eisenhower Aide

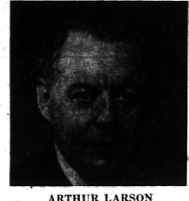
Commencement speaker for Cranbrook school's graduation exercises will be Arthur Larson, special assistant to President Eisenhower.

Larson will make the trip north from Washington to deliver his address June 14 in Christ Church Cranbrook, traditional scene of Cranbrook's commencements.

Larson became special assistant to the president last October. Prior to assuming that position he was director of the United States information agency for a year, and from April 1954 to November 1956 served as under secretary of labor.

DURING THE war years, 1941-1945, he was an attorney for the office of price administration. After the war he became a professor of law at Cornell law school, and in 1953 was appointed dean of the University of Pittsburgh school of law.

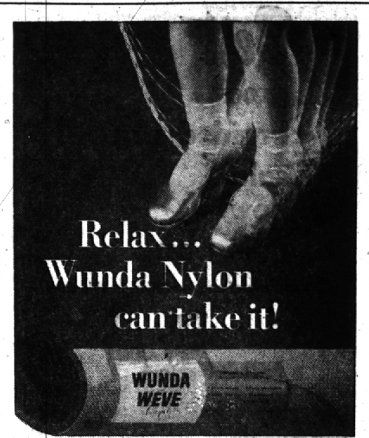
Birmingham B of E Sets Kindergarten Roundup Schedule
