Meet of Year Friday! It's Cranes, Maples for First Time Since '54

Two long winning streaks will be at stake tomorrow afternoon when Cranbrook and Birmingham track teams meet for the first time since 1954.

The Maples have won 31 straight outdoor dual meets. Cranbrook, who will be host to the renewal of the neighborhood rivalry, has capped 19 consecutive dual and triangular meets.

Birmingham, whose only dual loss since 1953 came in an indoor meet with Bedford in March, has victories over East Detroit, Kimball, Ferndale and Hazel Park to its credit this season.

Walled Lake, Ferndale and Detroit Catholic Central and victories in a pair of triangulars, with Berkeley and Ditts and with East Detroit and Orchard Lake St. Mary's.

That last Crane-Maple track encounter ended in a one-point triumph for Birmingham, 55-54. Birmingham is a slight favorite in tomorrow's clash. Starting time is 8:30 p.m.

THIRTY-TWO class A teams are entered. Birmingham, to send 24 competitors, finished fourth last year behind Highland Park, Groose Pointe and Dearborn Fordson.

Around Outdoors

To Tap Lakes for Trout Eggs

Four inland lakes in Michigan have been designated to play an important part in the possible restoration of lake trout to the Great Lakes.

Under a preliminary program approved by the state conservation commission at its April 17-18 meeting in Lansing, the four lakes would be tapped as a source of lake trout eggs needed in a restoration program.

The four lakes, where planted lake trout have thrived, are Higgins, Crystal, Elk and Torch.

Any restoration program, of course, depends on eradication of the sea lamprey in the Great Lakes. Experimental chemical treatment of lamprey spawning created by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife service shows promise that this predator will be controlled.

FRED A. WESTERMAN, chief of the department's fish division, said this encouraging program indicates "we should lay the groundwork at this time, but await developments before proceeding to any full scale effort in providing stock for planting the Great Lakes."

Westerman said some lake trout breeding stock is now being kept at the Department's Marquette hatchery, but fewer eggs are available from Lake Superior each year. Also, the capacity at Marquette is limited.

"Higgins, Torch and Crystal lakes at least are a potential source of eggs needed for hatchery culture in connection with the Great Lakes program," Westerman said. "If eggs can be obtained from these lakes and possible others, it might be less costly than to develop and maintain a large brood stock at some hatchery."

Final preparations for the warm weather season are under way in Michigan's 59 state parks and recreation areas, with a record number of parks users expected this year.

With favorable weather during spring, summer and fall, park attendance is expected to surpass the 17,857,000 visitors recorded last year. The all-time attendance mark was set in 1955 when 17,845,000 jammed into parks and recreation areas.

Bob Stephenson upped the Maple high jump standard a fraction of an inch Tuesday afternoon in an 80 1/3-28 2/3 rout of Hazel Park here.

The new mark is 6 feet 3/8 inch. It was his own record of 6 feet 1/4 inch that Stephenson bettered.

HE MADE ONLY one attempt at an inch higher height Tuesday. Birmingham had trimmed Ferndale, 59-50, Friday afternoon on the Linco's track. The defending Eastern Michigan league champs had been registered four loop du-

al triumphs with two EML foes left on the schedule.
