Model Recalls Past

Old-Time 'Puffers' Bring Back Memories for Ross

WESTWOOD MANOR — Many folks like Robert Ross have fond memories of old-time "puffers", steam engines that not only powered the railroads but operated a variety of farm equipment as well.

Ross, 59, Westwood lane, respects present high speed engines but he can't forget the Case steam traction engine he ran as a boy on an Ohio farm. So fond is his memory that he built a miniature working model.

His one-inch to a foot scale model is a replica of the last one traction motor built by the Case Steam Traction Engine Co. The year was 1915.

THE ENGINE is approximately 20 inches long and 10 inches wide and will have some 1750 parts when completed. Ross, a Ford Motor Co. executive, is an expert machinist. He made most of the parts on the 35-pound metal.

VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD ORDINANCE NO. 10

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REMOVAL AND DESTROYING OF NOXIOUS WEEDS IN THE VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD, AND FOR THE COLLECTION OF THE COST OF SUCH REMOVAL BY THE VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD BY SPECIAL ASSESSMENT PROCEDURES, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Village of Westwood Ordains:

Section 1. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Noxious Weed Ordinance of the Village of Westwood".

Section 2. It shall be the duty of every owner, occupant or person having charge or control of any land or premises in the Village of Westwood to cause to be cut down all Canada thistle (Cirsium arvense), dodders (any species of Cuscuta), mustards (charlock, black mustard and Indian mustard), species of Brassica (arvensis), perennial sowthistle (Sonchus arvensis), hoary alyssum (Berteris incana), ragwort (Euphrasia), and any other noxious weeds growing thereon in each and every year, or to cause to be cut down and destroyed any such weeds to seed; and if any such owner, occupant or person having charge of such lands shall suffer any such weeds to grow thereon, the same to ripen at such time as to be cut down and destroyed, he shall on conviction thereof, be punished by fine of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) or more than Twenty Dollars (20.00) together with costs of prosecution, and in default of same, he is imprisoned in the Oakland County jail for a period not exceeding ten (10) days.

Section 3. The Road Commissioner is hereby appointed Commissioner of Weeds pursuant to Act 359 of the Public Acts of 1941. It shall be the duty of said commissioner to give general notice to the owners of property or occupiers of any subdivided land in the Village of Westwood whereon noxious weeds are growing. Said notice shall order the cutting and destroying of such noxious weeds, which shall be by publication in a newspaper circulated in said village at least ten (10) days previous to July 1 of each year, if any weeds so ordered to be cut and destroyed by July 1 as aforesaid are not removed by the owner or occupant of the premises, then the Commissioner is hereby authorized to enter upon the land and destroy said weeds at the expense of the persons failing to comply with said published notice.

Section 4. The Commissioner shall keep an accurate account of the expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance with respect to each parcel of land entered upon under the terms of this Ordinance. The amount of such expenses incurred in the destruction of such weeds, or persons so failing to comply with the order of the Commissioner to remove such noxious weeds, in the cost of the cutting and destroying of such weeds, or persons so failing to comply with the order of the Commissioner to remove such noxious weeds, shall be a lien upon said lands from and after the certification by the Commissioner to the Village Manager, and a copy of such certification shall be filed by the Commissioner with the Village Clerk.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days from its publication.

Made and passed by the Village Council of the Village of Westwood, this 5th day of May, A. D. 1958.
