General Marshall, author and military affairs authority, has written a new book "Sinai Victory" which examines command decisions in history's shortest war, Israel's 100-hour conquest of Egypt east of Suez in autumn of 1956.

HR 18 is also the author of 10 other major literary works, one of which, "Park Chop Hill," was made into a motion picture. He participated in numerous battles and campaigns in World War I and II. He established the Army News Service, developed the plan for indoctrination of enemy prisoners of war, was an expert consultant to the Secretary of War, was Chief of Orientation, Army of the United States and was chief historian of the European Theater of War.
