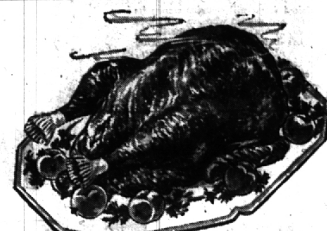
Student Appears In German Play

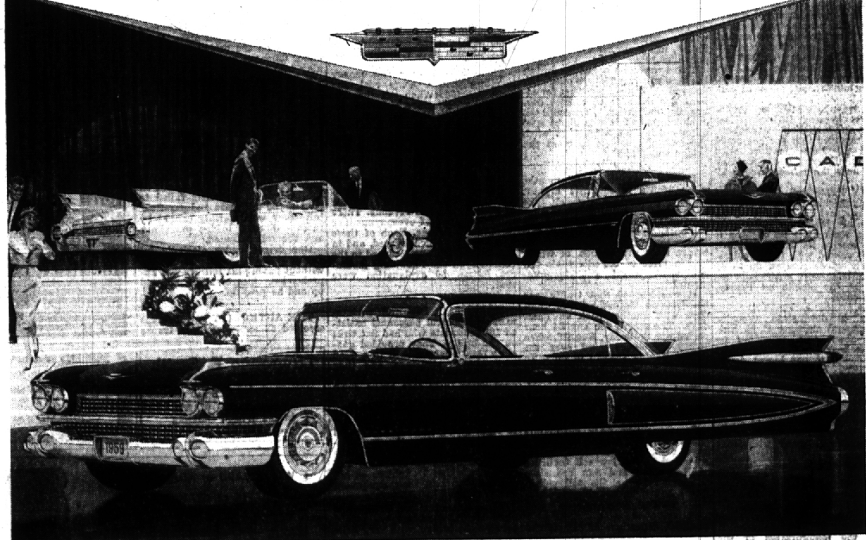
