This is just one of the many things which I like here. I am looking forward to Thanksgiving and Christmas. We don't have this kind of holiday.

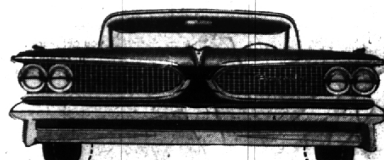

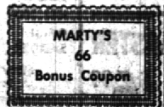
