Southfield Won't OK Expressway, Council Resolves

SOUTHFIELD—Until they are told where it will go when it is extended, the City of Southfield's council has stated it will oppose the state highway department's proposed expressway along 11 1/2 Mile road.

The \$14.5 million east-west expressway met opposition from Southfield officials when it was discussed at a public hearing last Thursday in Farmington.

The eight miles of expressway is proposed as a major link in the beltline expressway system ring the metropolitan Detroit area, according to highway Commissioner John C. Mackie. Starting at US-16 near Haggerty road, it would link the route with North western highway and Telegraph road, ending with exits onto both roads at about 11 1/2 Mile.

It will eventually extend to connect Northwestern with the Chrysler expressway, in a route not yet announced.

The Southfield council resolved that "it will vigorously oppose new expressways... to be constructed within its boundaries."

Gas Franchise Vote Is Wednesday in Lathrup

LATHRUP—There'll be one more trip to the polls this year for Lathrup residents. Next Wednesday, Dec. 3, they will vote on the Consumers' Power gas franchise.

Mayor Richard N. Cogger said Monday that he hoped for a fairly large turnout, so that the 30-year franchise is not granted or defeated by lack of interest. Sixty per cent of those voting must approve the franchise before it can be granted by the city.

Hanson Hedgcock, district manager for Consumers, told council members a reminder letter will go out Monday to all Lathrup voters.

IN A FINAL review, for the benefit of council members, Hedgcock said that if the franchise is granted, there for gas will not cause unsightly diggings. Lines

are now installed by tunneling. He estimated residents' gas installation costs at about \$1.10 per foot from the main.

City Administrator Jerald Stone will borrow four voting machines from the City of Southfield for the election because Lathrup machines cannot be used for thirty days after an election. They are still sealed by state law, following the November balloting.

All election expenses are being borne by the Consumers' Power company.
