reported that the 3,351 signatures on the petition have been certified since the mass representers over 10 per cent of the total township property owners, a referendum must be held at a date to be announced.

The petition is an outgrowth of dissatisfaction among property owners in Green Lake subdivision over rezoning to commercial use of property on Commerce road. By law a referendum cannot be held on one part of a zoning amendment, so it will be voted on as a whole.

FURTHER action by the board included adoption of a zoning code.

Permission was granted the department of public works to take over operation of the water system in West Bloomfield subdivision. Before allowing installation in the same subdivision of a temporary sewage system, to be connected later with the Farmington interceptor, the board asked the department of public works to furnish a detailed layout of the proposed system.

Plans for the development of Shorewood Hills subdivision were approved. The 81-lot subdivision lies east of Middlebelt, north of Long Lake road.

They visited Hot Springs and Little Rock, Ark., and Vincennes, Ind., and arrived home Nov. 16.

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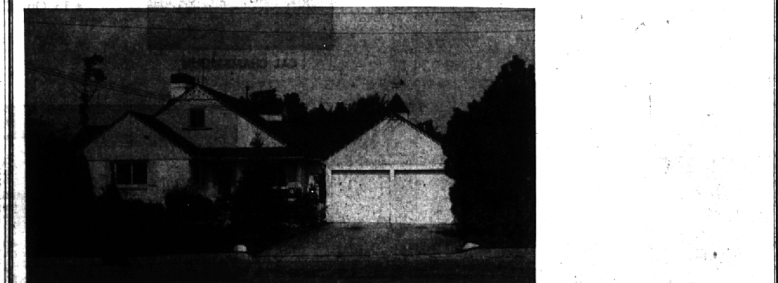
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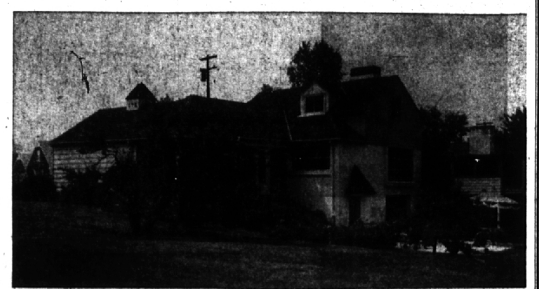
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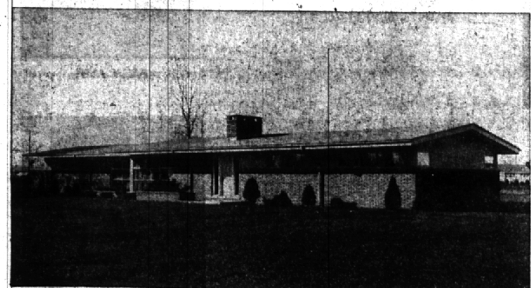
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
