College President To Attend Tea For Anniversary

A tea will be Monday at the home of Mrs. Simon E. Knudsen, 31600 Bingham road, Birmingham, from 2 to 5 p.m., honoring Dr. Rosemary Park, president of Connecticut College for Women. The occasion will be a "Kick-Off" for 50th anniversary fund. Purpose is mainly to raise faculty salaries. Dr. Park was inaugurated as fifth president of Connecticut college in 1947. She is the third woman president of this liberal arts college for women since its founding in New London in 1915. Before going to Connecticut college as a language instructor in 1935, Miss Park taught at the Winsor school and at Wheaton college. Summer vacations were spent in writing and travel, visiting Germany, Austria, Italy, France, England, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia and Switzerland. 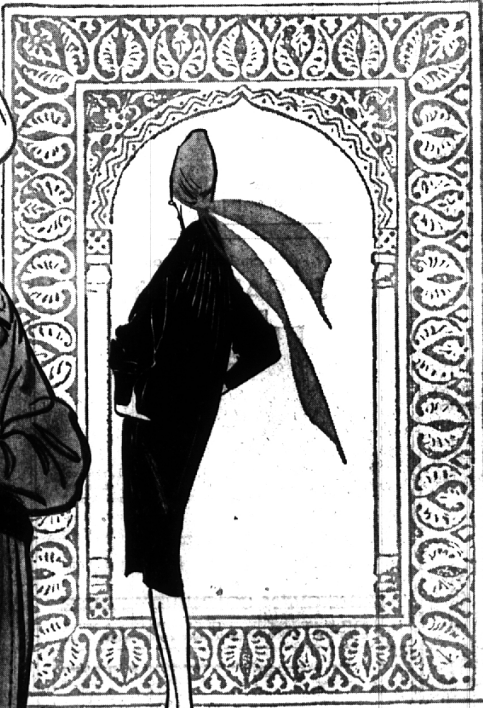
