Dinner Party Reveals Troth

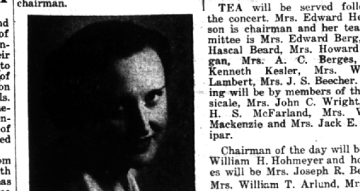
