

## Westwood Council Names Woman to Planning Group

WESTWOOD—Councilmen appointed the village's first lady planning commissioner, and heard a disappointing progress report on village road work at their meeting Monday night.

THEY named Mrs. Maurice V. Rogers, 3020 Woodhaven, as the ninth member of the city's new planning commission. Councilman Ted Shurtliff, who placed her name before the council, said Mrs. Rogers had taken an active part in the village's formation, and was "enthusiastic about everything she goes into."

THE village's new police car will be a white Ford four-door, approved for purchase at a cost of \$2,000. Director of Public Safety Robert Murphy recommended the four-door in place of the combination ambulance-station wagon. He said with ambulance service available in Birmingham, the station wagon was not being used for transporting the sick or injured.

MURPHY recommended nine street lights for the village—at 14 and Lahser, 13 and Lahser, 14 and Evergreen, Beverly and Southfield, Beverly and Pierce, 14 Mile, Riverside, and Beverly at Evergreen, and at the village offices. The council tabled the recommendation. The council asked Public Safety Director Murphy to work with Detroit Country Day school to seek a way that will permit vehicles to turn into the school safely.

Representatives of the school at 13 Mile and Lahser said buses and cars turning off 13 Mile into the school entrance near a hill are endangered by cars speeding over the hill.

VILLAGE President Marvin Cline suggested a battery-operated

flasher warning sign. Councilman Robert Reed will investigate costs of a road apron for turn-offs.

On the road work program now underway, Reed told the councilmen, "I am not particularly happy with what's happening; nor is Road Commissioner Waldo Asbury."

The council agreed to set a special meeting next week to get a full report from a representative of village's new road contractor. The firm had other commitments at the time they contracted with Westwood, according to Reed. He said only a small portion of the road program set up for this fall has been completed.

BECAUSE forms for sidewalk construction permits were not printed up for the village until June 1, 1959, the deadline for Fair-fax street sidewalks near Greenfield school.

The council approved contingent upon the village attorney's agreement, a contract with the Oakland county DPW for the Evergreen interceptor. (See story on p. 1.) The project's total estimated cost to the village is \$326,000. The council was told, with annual payments at about \$27,500.

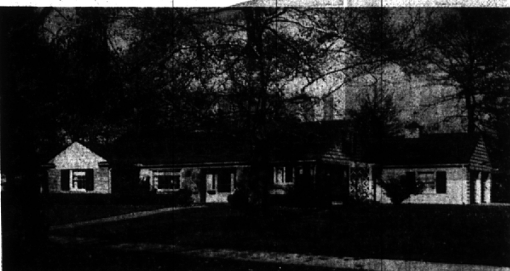

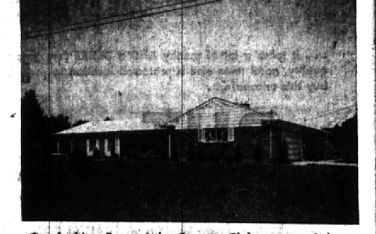
