Mrs. Spencer, of 16160 Beechwood, said she had her phone disconnected after the election because the flood of calls relating to village business were upsetting her home life.

VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD ORDINANCE NO. 20

"AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 4 ENTITLED 'AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND OTHER VEHICLES; TO PROVIDE FOR PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES; TO DEFINE DUTIES WHEN ACCIDENTS OCCUR; TO PROVIDE FOR ADMINISTRATION; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.'"

The Village of Westwood Ordinance No. 4 of the Village of Westwood entitled "An Ordinance To Provide For The Regulation Of Motor Vehicles; To Provide For Pedestrian Rights And Duties; To Define Duties When Accidents Occur; To Provide For Administration; And To Provide Penalties For Violation Of Any Of The Provisions Of This Ordinance" he and the same are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1.1. Sections 55 (1), 73 and 74 of Ordinance No. 4 of the Village of Westwood entitled "An Ordinance To Provide For The Regulation Of Motor Vehicles; To Provide For Pedestrian Rights And Duties; To Define Duties When Accidents Occur; To Provide For Administration; And To Provide Penalties For Violation Of Any Of The Provisions Of This Ordinance" be and the same are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 55 (1). Windshield. 1. No person shall drive any motor vehicle on the highways of the Village of Westwood with a windshield, sideview or side or rear window material upon the front windshield, sideview or side or rear windows of such vehicle which obstructs the driver's clear view of the highway or any intersecting highway; or with any dangling ornament or other suspended object except as authorized by law which in any way obstructs the vision of the driver of the vehicle.

2. The windshield on every motor vehicle operated on the highways of the Village of Westwood shall be equipped with a device for cleaning rain, snow or other moisture from the windshield, which device shall be so constructed as to be controlled or operated by the driver of the vehicle.

3. Every windshield wiper upon a motor vehicle shall be maintained in good working order.

4. No commercial vehicle licensed as such shall be operated on the highways of the Village of Westwood at any time between December 15 and March 15, both dates inclusive, unless it is equipped with a hot air windshield defroster or an electrically heated windshield or such other scientific method that may be devised so long as same is heated and maintained in operable condition at all times.

5. No motor vehicle licensed as such, and manufactured after January 1, 1956, shall be operated on the highways of the Village of Westwood unless it is equipped with a windshield wiper maintained in operable condition at all times and capable of cleaning the windshield in such a fashion as to leave the driver with a clear view of the highway or any intersecting highway.

Section 73. Duties to Stop at Scene of Accidents Involving Death or Personal Injury or Damage to Vehicles. The driver of any vehicle who knows or has reason to believe that he has been involved in an accident resulting in injury to or death of any person or damage to any vehicle which is driven or attended by any person shall give his name, address, and the registration number of the vehicle he is driving and shall upon request exhibit his operator's or chauffeur's license to the person struck or the driver, or occupant of or person attending any vehicle collided with, or when practical shall render to any person injured in such accident reasonable assistance, including the making of arrangements for the transportation of such person to a physician, surgeon, or hospital for medical or surgical treatment if necessary, or if such transportation is requested by the injured person.

Section 201. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall become effective immediately upon publication.

Made and passed by the Village Council of the Village of Westwood, this 3rd day of November A. D., 1958.

cause the Oakland County board of supervisors made that Monday.

At that time, Schone said, present the completed contracts to the board, to get that group's formal authorization to sell bonds for the Evergreen project. The high interest rate on the bonds, expected to cost approximately \$5,200,000 including interest.

WITH DEER season and the holidays coming up, Schone said, Monday's meeting of the supervisors might be the last this year. He expects the bond resolution Monday, the matter will go to the Michigan Municipal Finance commission for processing bonds.

With almost 50 per cent of the time wait for bond approval expected to be cut, Schone said he felt bonds could be sold around the first of the year. Work could get underway in the spring.

THE AGREEMENTS presented did not include the village of Bingham Farms and Franklin. Schone said, since their charters require an election, they will be approved before entering into contracts for sewage disposal.

While Franklin was voting on the sewer Tuesday, Schone said, Franklin's entry into the district would be a part of the Westwood village was inserted in lieu of the township.

Removal of the township, Franklin and Bingham Farms from the main section of the Evergreen district, Schone said, deleted \$5,000 in estimated annual costs, being redistributed among the remaining municipalities.

THE ADDITIONAL cost to other governmental units would vary from \$2,113.37 added to Southfield City's cost of \$258,000 to \$117 for Pontiac township.

Capital costs for the main project — the portion of the interconnector running from 14 Mile to the 8 Mile road connection with Detroit's sewage disposal system — would be raised by applying percentages to each municipality.

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP'S share would be 22.6 per cent; Birmingham, 9.50; Bloomfield Hills, 4.18; Lathrup village, 4.51; City of Southfield, 37.51; Troy, 11.40; Westwood village, 7.90; and Pontiac township, 2.07.

Payments are to be made in 30 annual installments. Service charges for sewage disposal in each municipality, the contract states, would be based upon the amount of water it consumes as measured by master water meters. Where no community water system is used, service charges will be on a unit basis.

SCONE said municipalities could finance the sewer through charging a connecting fee, or a sewage disposal charge, special assessments, or out of surplus funds.

Asked if homes with septic tanks would be required to abandon them and connect up to the new interconnector, Schone cited a county regulation which states that new structures must connect with a sewer system within six months after it is made available.

THERE IS some doubt as to whether this could be made retroactive, Schone said. Westwood village Attorney Tom Dillon said he didn't think the county law could
