All posted four wins and two losses.

The Tigers won their sixth straight victory to complete an undefeated season by defeating the Hoosiers 19 to 0. The first Tiger score was tallied by Ronnie Mattson in the first quarter on an eight-yard run. Chuck Hutton, Tiger quarterback, ran 20 yards in the second quarter. Just before the end of the first half, Don Outman raced 79 yards on an end run, his 10th touchdown of the year.

left-left the hunters weed out the excess does and bucks and keep the herd within bounds as the deer have enough natural food for the survivors.

THE PROGRAM has now been in existence for six years and the department feels the results, although not conclusive, warrant its continuation.

And so that the holders of those "any deer permits" don't feel self-conscious about, over 50 per cent of the licensed deer hunters applied for the permits this year.

In asking deer hunters to be sure and not shoot one of the protected elk now in the lower peninsula woods, the Conservation Department gave this guide in spotting the difference between an elk and a buck.

"Elk are about as big as a medium-sized horse, while the average deer—despite mule deer yards to the contrary, measures three and one-half feet or less at the shoulder."
