

American Good Will Appreciated Abroad

Want to have a heart-warming experience of a group of Americans who were making a Scandinavian cruise last summer on the *Helmski* in Helsinki, Finland? This little country, like many others, the beneficiary of some American financial gifts and loans, always has been appreciative of U.S. help, even though numerous other nations have not.

MRS. BESS YORK, 29144 Southgate drive, Southdale, last summer was enjoying a trip scheduled on the *Statenland*, operated by Grace Rally's Birmingham Travel Bureau. Upon her return she told Mrs. Rally the story of how the Helsinki citizens treated the Statenland and its crew and passengers. The passengers were so impressed that they called their friends to the New York office of the United Press International news office. Here is the tale:

"WE HAVE JUST departed from Helsinki, Finland, after a stopover of only 15 hours. Yet in that short time a new high in international goodwill was established. It was upon arrival over 500 American passengers were greeted by almost 1000 residents of Helsinki. All day thousands came to see our ship and pay their respects. The weather was bad, it was cold and raw. Yet the crowds collected on the dock and stood patiently behind the ropes manned by only two policemen.

"Finally, when the ship's whistle blew over 5,000 men, women and children had massed on the dock to wave us a fond farewell. Straggle enough and in contrast to abuses suffered by other American citizens elsewhere, we were cheered by the populace and spontaneous cry of 'Wa like like' roared over the waters as the ship departed.

"THE THOUSANDS on shore waved until we were out of sight. A conveyer of over 50 small craft packed to the gunwales with cheering and waving occupants escorted the Statenland out of the harbor and into the Gulf of Finland. It was only then that the conveyer sailed and respectfully and reluctantly returned to shore.

"This was a sight to see. It is a moment that all passengers aboard will always cherish. Hard bitten naval officers and former combat soldiers of the past and present, who had been welcomed as liberators, emphasized that today's welcome and sendoff surpassed anything ever before experienced by them.

Higher Speed On W. Maple Being Debated

Higher speeds on West Maple? Birmingham city commissioners are divided on the estimated results of a five-mile-per-hour increase, so they asked Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley for his recommendation.

The disagreement arose as the commission read a letter from Charles Erickson, 3000 Morningview, Bloomfield Village, Erickson drives over W. Maple to and from his Detroit office.

EMPHASIZING he had not received a speeding ticket, Erickson said he would never drive a driver's record if the speed was raised to 35 mph. It now is 30.

Commissioners Charles Entwistle and William Burgum led the proponents of the higher speed. They said it was the practical thing to do. They recalled that both state police and county road commission had recommended 35 mph.

Moxley said an August survey showed the average speed was 34 mph, with 85 per cent of drivers staying under 40 mph.

Mayor Carl F. Ingraham led the opposition, claiming 30 mph is fast enough.

A Kingsley Inn spokesman said Wednesday that specifications are being drawn for the installation of a chlorination system, which was part of the original permit conditions specified by the water resources commission in Lansing.

The water resources commission will meet in Detroit Oct. 31 to evaluate the situation.
